I congratulated the students, who will begin their studies at Hartnell and complete their bachelor's degree at CSUMB before entering the workforce in a county that is desperately in need of additional teacher candidates. I also thanked their parents and friends who have helped them make what I believe will prove to be the best choice in their lives.

The evening's keynote speaker was Hartnell alum Zandra Jo Galvan, superintendent of the Greenfield Union School District. Betsy Buchalter Adler, a trustee of the Claire Giannini Fund, a major TPP funder, gave closing remarks and helped present certificates to the students.

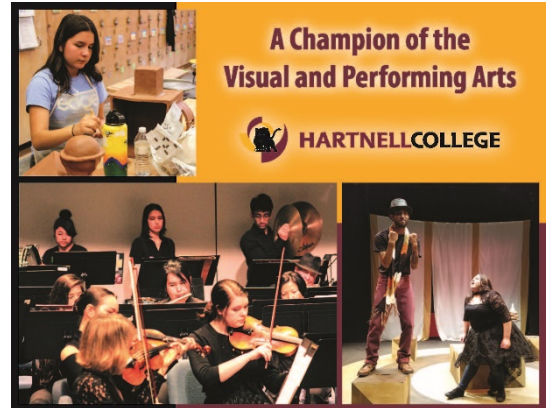
have been held in King City, Gonzales, Castroville and Greenfield.

Dr. Hsieh and trustees meet with Bishop Garcia of Monterey Diocese

On Feb. 4, I was joined by Board of Trustees President Aurelio Salazar Jr. and Trustee Erica Padilla-Chavez in a meeting with Bishop Richard Garcia of the Monterey Diocese, which includes the Hartnell Community College District.

We met with Garcia, who was installed as the bishop last January, to get acquainted and establish a connection with the diocese and its work on behalf of people in our area.

Padilla-Chavez said she the Catholic Church can play an important role in communicating about college programs and services, particularly in such communities as Soledad and Castroville, where Hartnell will soon open new education centers.



"It reminded me that of who we are," she said in her report at the close of the Feb. 4 Board of Trustees meeting. "At the end of the day regardless of what student comes to us, we are the

seed that's planting that sense of hope. ... Our data have demonstrated that we actually are doing a good job of getting students to where they need to be."

Nursing programs once again ranked in Top 10 statewide

For the third time in the last year, a statewide ranking of nursing education programs has ranked Hartnell in the top 10 – eighth to be exact.

The online ranking and information service registerednursing.org gave Hartnell's Associate Degree of Nursing program ahead of both four-year and other two-year programs and awarded a score of 97.94 based on students' current and past performance on the NCLEX-RN licensure exam.



"Hartnell's associate degree in nursing and LVN to RN programs prepare students to care for a variety of patient populations," said registerednursing.org. "With diploma in hand, Hartnell students emerge ready to demonstrate client advocacy in the health care setting."

Similarly, the website RNCareers.org last May ranked Hartnell ninth in California for associate degree registered nursing programs and among the best nursing schools in the nation with a grade of 97.06%. Another nursing career website, nursingprocess.org, in April issued its own ranking, placing Hartnell fifth in the state.

Engeldinger joins campus as interim VP for human resources

Lyle Engeldinger joined Hartnell on Feb. 5 as interim vice president for human resources and equal opportunity. He comes to us from Barstow College, where he has served as vice president for human resources and equal opportunity officer since 2017.

Preceding a sabbatical to study adult learning theory as a doctoral candidate at Walden University in Minneapolis, Minn., Engeldinger was dean of human resources and diversity and acting vice president of human resources at Pasadena City College from 2008 to 2011, and for 10 years before that he was dean of human resources, diversity and training at Ohlone College. In addition to faculty roles in business at Pasadena City and Ohlone, he had a lengthy career as corporate vice president and general manager with the American Automobile Association.



Engeldinger holds a Master's of Business Administration and a BS in Business Administration from the University of Phoenix and a computer studies certificate from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

The search process for a new permanent vice president of human resources at Hartnell continues on schedule, with an appointment anticipated in late spring.

Dr. Yahdi attends Jumpstart workshop sponsored by NSF-HIS Resource Hub

Math faculty member Dr. Mohammed Yahdi participated in the 2020 Jumpstart workshop sponsored by the National Science Foundation-Hispanic Serving Institutions (NSF-HSI) National Resource Hub for STEM Education on Jan. 24-25 at Clovis Community College.



The focus of these workshops included grantsmanship to increase NSF grant support for HSIs, fostering institutional capacity required to support STEM education and research, sharing best practices to improve student outcomes in STEM, and establishing a network among participants for sustained communication and professional development that build and strengthen collaborations among HSIs in the region.

The NSF National Resource Hub for STEM Education at Hispanic Serving Institutions, where Dr. Yahdi is a member, provides HSIs with resources for building institutional capacity that will increase STEM student retention and degree completion.

Students gain certification in Mental Health First Aid



The Mental Health First Aid team kicked off the spring semester with certification training for 11 students on Jan. 31.

This interactive training, similar to CPR training but for mental health, allows participants to obtain a three-year certification that can be used for professional development credit. It covers various mental health disorders, signs and symptoms and introduces participants to the ALGEE

action plan (Assess, Listen, Give information, Encourage professional help and Encourage self-help strategies).

"Most importantly it provides education and knowledge which can save a life and help decrease stigma associated with mental health, as well as a list of community references and referrals," said training certified facilitator Gemma Uribe-Cruz, who is also a counselor-instructor in the Hartnell Veterans Program.

She said more training opportunities will be offered this spring, with information on dates, times and how to RSVP coming soon.

Swimmers claim victories in first meet for revived program

The Panthers made their competitive return to the pool on Jan. 31 as Hartnell Swimming headed to Cabrillo for the college's first meet since 2003.

A combined men's and women's team of 20 traveled to Aptos, where Emily Pacheco and Jeremiah Disimone became the team's first event winners. Pacheco came from behind on the final lap of the 200 freestyle, and Disimone dominated the 200 individual medley, arguably the hardest event of the meet. Robert Ehlers won the 500 freestyle, and Pacheco went on to win the 100 backstroke as well. Also impressive were the personal records set by Guadalupe Solis in two events and Thomas Villalobos in one.



Head Swim and Dive Coach Joel McKown said he is very happy with the team's progress and credits his fellow coaches, Hartnell Hall of Fame member Tom Campbell and Bob Enea, who began his coaching career in 1968 at the Salinas YMCA. "These assistant coaches have provided our student athletes with a wealth of knowledge, feedback and support," McKown said.

The Panthers head to the City College of San Francisco Invitational on Feb. 7-8, and the following weekend the Hartnell Dive Team will join up with the swimmers to make their debut at the Coast Conference Kick-Off. McKown said he expects diver Doug Lynch to be a standout off the diving board this year.

Proposition 13 seeks billions for school and college building

California Proposition 13, also called the School and College Facilities Bond, will be on the statewide ballot in the March 3, election, offering voters the opportunity to authorize \$15 billion in general obligation bonds for school and college facilities, including \$2 billion for community colleges.

This same type of ballot measure previously enabled Hartnell to obtain support from district voters in 2016 for the \$167 million in Measure T bond, which is currently funding expansion of the



King City Education Center, new centers in Soledad and Castroville, and a new Center for Nursing & Health Sciences on the Main Campus in Salinas, as well as modernization of the Main Quad and classrooms in buildings D and E.

Supporters of [Proposition 13](#) are going out of their way to distinguish it from an earlier Proposition 13, which was enacted in 1978 and amended the state Constitution regarding property tax rates.

Harlem Globetrotters to perform in Hartnell Gymnasium on Feb. 12

As part of the tour, the Globetrotters will celebrate the 10th anniversary of the four-point shot, a shot 30 feet from the basket, which they introduced to the sport in 2010.
