### Monterey County Film Commission Announces Winners in 2022 Film Student Scholarship Program

The Monterey County Film Commission announced the two top winners and one honorary mention winner in the film commssion's 2022 Director Emeritus Richard Tyler Film Student Scholarship Award program on Dec. 27, 2022.

Selected for \$1,500 scholarships are David Orta, a Greenfield resident and film student at Hartnell Community College, and Laska Stanford of Marina, a California State University, Monterey Bay (CSUMB) student in the Cinematic Arts and Technology Department. Diego Garcia of Lemoore, also a film student at CSUMB received a \$500 scholarship.

Established in 2008, the Monterey County Film Commission's scholarship program provides financial aid and incentive to students of film as well as beginning filmmakers who reside in Monterey County, or those enrolled in a college or university here. The fund is a permanent endowment with the Community Foundation for Monterey County.







# Career and Technical Education Employment Outcomes Survey

California Community Colleges recently shared CTE Employment Outcomes Survey results. All reports contain only credit students unless otherwise specified. The results of the survey showed that completing CTE studies and training – whether or not a credential is earned, whether or not a student transfers – is related to positive employment outcomes. The preponderance of respondents are employed and are working in the same field as their studies or training. Notably, students realize a greater wage gain after completing their studies if they secure a job that is similar to their program of study.


How satisfied are students with the education and training they received?




How many months did it take for students to find a job?




What is your current employment status?




How many students secured a job that is closely related to their program of study?

## Reality Pathways Installation

At the Student Success Conference on January 20, 40+ faculty members participated in the Reality Pathways workshop.

Reality Pathways is a compliment to the Guided Pathways initiative at Hartnell College. The goal of Guided Pathways is to help students enter and stay on an educational path and finish in a timely fashion.

Reality Pathways is a project that acknowledges the reality that most Hartnell students are part-time students, do not finish in the traditional two-year time frame, and have many challenges that can prevent them from continuing education.

Faculty members plotted their own journeys since high school, highlighting key career, educational, familial and personal successes, as well as stops and do-overs. Each faculty member drew out their unique path, and a common theme emerged: none of the faculty participating had a direct path to their current career, and many had significant obstacles to overcome.

These pathways are now on display in the Hartnell Student Center and will be available for public viewing through February 21 (pics attached). The hope is that students seeing the diverse pathways of their teachers will help keep them motivated when their own paths take unexpected turns.
