


In 2017, Standard & Poor's Rating Services raised Hartnell's rating to AA/ Stable. They cited the following reasons for the upgrade from AA-:

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

- From 2011-19, **degree completion** is up 159 percent, certificate completion is up 320 percent and university transfers are up 67 percent – with just a 2 percent increase in full-time-equivalent enrollment.
- Through **CSin3**, a nationally unique **computer science partnership** with Cal State Monterey Bay (CSUMB), students complete a bachelor's degree in three years.
- More than 1,000 students have completed STEM research internships in the past 12 years, culminating in a yearly "Research Symposium," unheard of among community colleges.
- In 2019, registered nursing and licensed vocational nursing students had a pass rate of 100 percent on their state exams.
- Hartnell students received the highly competitive Cooke College Scholarship in 2017 and 2019, and three students are semifinalists for this prestigious nationwide award.

COMMUNITY IMPACT

- Graduates of the **Teacher Preparation Pathway**, a cohort-based 2+2 program in partnership with CSUMB, help ease the acute shortage of teachers in the Salinas Valley.
- Hartnell's innovative alliance with the agriculture industry led to receipt of the Public-Private Partnership Award from the Monterey Bay Economic Partnership.
- The **DREAMer Center**, serving the unique needs of more than 800 undocumented students, was the first among California community colleges when it opened in 2016.
- The Salinas Valley Health Professions Pathway Partnership has created strategic alliances across industry, K-12 education and universities and contributed to successful outcomes for nursing and healthcare programs.
- Beginning in 2011, the Women's Education and Leadership Institute (WELI) and the Men's Institute for Leadership and Education (MILE) have helped 325 returning students graduate, with scholarships, mentoring and life-skills training.
