The 16,750-square-foot Soledad Education Center will provide a completely new, multipurpose campus that will allow more students to pursue their educational goals close to home.

OPERATIONS SEED MONEY

Bond Measure T provided \$11.6 million in capital for Hartnell College to construct the buildings and purchase the basic furniture and equipment for the classrooms. We need to raise \$1.25 million to provide seed money for the first five years of operational costs associated with opening a new center.
